

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INTRODUCTION

Scripture speaks of the Church as a body, a living organism that is to manifest the life of Christ from within. To accomplish that God has so designed the body with many individual members who are equipped with unique gifts which have specific functions. A proper understanding and use of spiritual gifts by each member of the body is essential if the body (the church) is to grow to maturity.

'There is one body and one Spirit ... But grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gifts. And his gifts were that some should be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, for the equipment of the saints, for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.' (Paul)

Body ministry grows as we use our spiritual gifts. So it is important to know how our spiritual gifts apply to our lives and ministry. This book can help you learn how to discover and to exercise your spiritual gifts.

Spiritual gifts can be studied in many different ways. This study is a brief summary of the various gifts of the Spirit, not as boxes or categories, but as currents in the wind of the Spirit and currents in the river of God. The studies cover:

The manifold grace of God – speaking and serving gifts (1 Peter 4:10-11).

Motivational gifts from God our Father (Romans 12:4-8).

Ministry gifts from Christ Jesus (Ephesians 4:11).

Manifestations of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:8-10).

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Bible passages on the church as the body of Christ emphasize spiritual gifts. All God's people have spiritual gifts.

Two obvious but sometimes overlooked aspects of spiritual gifts need our attention: they are gifts, and they are spiritual.

They are gifts

Spiritual gifts are given, they develop with use, and they vary among us all.

1. Gifts are given, not earned

Christ our Lord, the head of his church, gives gifts to his people as he chooses. We do not gain them by special effort, holiness, orthodoxy or obedience. They are not a prize for good works, pure living, correct doctrine or personal dedication. Gifts of God's amazing grace often show up in most unlikely people.

Our obedience to God enhances our spiritual gifts. Like jewels in fine settings they shine best in wholehearted surrender to God's will and in holy lives. The gifts, nevertheless, are not a reward for obedience nor a measure of our obedience. Like our abilities, they are part of us even when we fail

or sin. Paul reminds us that 'the gifts and the call of God are irrevocable" (Romans 11:29).

God gives. We receive. His gifts express and demonstrate his grace; they do not depend on our worthiness.

2. Gifts develop with use

They may not grow in us just because we are holy or dedicated. The more we respond to God in love and obedience, of course, the more anointed we will be and the more Christ-like we will become. Our Christ-likeness is the arena in which our gifts can grow and flourish. That growth, however, comes from use not from our worthiness.

Young, immature Christians can use their spiritual gifts wholeheartedly or enthusiastically and find that they grow in that use. They begin praying in simple faith for the needs of others. Their prayers are answered; their faith grows. As their faith grows their prayers and ministry become stronger. Yet they could still be immature Christians or not Christ-like. They may have much to learn, habits to change, deeper surrenders to make, and more of the fruit of the Spirit to show in their lives. Nevertheless, they can grow rapidly in using their spiritual gifts.

Spiritual gifts are given to use, not to hide away. We grow in ministry as we use our gifts for God's glory. Gifts may also be abused, misused for our own glory, or used without love in harsh and divisive ways. *The answer to abuse and misuse is not disuse but proper use – for the glory of God.*

3. Gifts vary

We differ from each other in personalities and in our gifting. As Christians we all have the Spirit of God within us. So we can grow in using a variety of the gifts of the Spirit and grow in using Christ-like fruit of the Spirit.

We don't need to mechanically limit God's work in our lives to just some of the gifts and some of the fruit of his Spirit in our lives. Most of us are more spiritually gifted than we realize. God gives abundantly. The fruit and gifts

of his Spirit flow within and among us in many unexpected ways and in beautiful harmony.

Other people in Christ's body often see our gifts more clearly than we do. Each of us needs to know our gifting and others can help us understand that, especially our spiritual elders or leaders. It's unwise to think we have gifts which others do not see in us.

We can also confuse our natural abilities with spiritual gifts. Others can help us see the difference and use both for God's glory. So we can confirm and encourage one another in using and developing our abilities and gifts.

They are spiritual

Our spiritual gifts are not just human abilities, they belong to the body of Christ, and we need one another to function with our spiritual gifts.

1. Spiritual gifts are spiritual; not just human abilities

These special or spiritual gifts come from the Holy Spirit who is the Spirit of Jesus and the Spirit of God (Galatians 4:6). God's Spirit expresses his life in us. He works in and through us as we yield ourselves to him and respond to his prompting or leading.

Personality and natural abilities differ from spiritual gifts although our spiritual gifts are expressed through them and enhance them. Both our natural abilities and our spiritual gifts bring glory to God. They flow together in our lives and service.

Our natural human abilities, however, can get in the way and choke off spiritual power. We may depend on them and not on God.

A preacher may be gifted in speaking, for example, so may not really listen to God's Spirit nor depend on Him. Even agnostics or atheists can preach scholastic sermons. Some do! On the other hand, the gift of prophecy or speaking God's word can flow with great power and wide impact through

those naturally gifted in oratory or scholarship, but also in people not naturally gifted in public speaking.

Likewise, a Sunday School or Church School teacher may be an expert teacher who can use teaching aids well. Yet unless that teacher also uses a spiritual gift for teaching and caring for those being taught, the teaching is unlikely to give life. Similarly, a children's teacher who is gifted spiritually in teaching will usually be effective, and that gift may also be expressed powerfully through natural teaching ability as well.

2. Spiritual gifts belong to the body of Christ

"The unspiritual person does not receive the gifts of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to them, and they are not able to understand them because they are spiritually discerned" (1 Corinthians 2:14).

Christians share Christ's life. His Spirit indwells and empowers us. Yet, we can limit his work in and through us. We can quench the Spirit (1 Thessalonians 5:19), grieve the Spirit (Ephesians 4:30), and resist God's Spirit (Acts 7.51). We all do at times. Only Jesus was fully led by the Spirit all the time.

Even if our gifts have already grown with some use, we can still resist God's Spirit in our lives. Then our ministry suffers. It fails to be as effective and powerful as it could be. Body ministry (the body of Christ functioning together) works well when all of us respond more fully to God's spirit.

3. We need one another for body ministry

No one is gifted in everything. All of us as members of Christ's body share in ministry together; no one person can do it all. Spiritual ministry flows through all kinds of people in all kinds of ways.

That is the amazing but basic fact about body ministry: it is literally Christ's body, not ours. We all are part of his body. Our spiritual gifts enable body ministry when we are led and empowered by the Spirit.

Body Ministry – in One Body

Each passage on the gifts of the Spirit stresses that we are one body in Christ (1 Corinthians 12:12-13; Romans 12:4-5; Ephesians 4:4). The whole context of Paul's teaching on the gifts of the Spirit is one of unity with diversity; unity in community; one body with many parts functioning in harmony. Paul repeats many themes in the three key passages in 1 Corinthians 12, Romans 12, and Ephesians 4:

- **One body:** The church is the one body of Christ on earth (1 Corinthians 12:12-27; Romans 12:4-5; Ephesians 4:4-6).
- **Gracious gifts:** They are given, not earned and not achieved (1 Corinthians 12:1, 4, 6, 8-11; Romans 12:6; Ephesians 4:7-8, 11).
- All Christians have gifts: There are no exceptions; and each gift is important (I Corinthians 12:7; Romans 12:6; Ephesians 4:7).
- **Gifts differ:** Value our differences; we need each other (1 Corinthians 12:4-7; Romans 12:4-6; Ephesians 4:7 8).
- **Unity:** They function in unity and promote unity (1 Corinthians 12:12-13, 25; Romans 12:4-5; Ephesians 4:3, 13, 16).
- **Maturity:** Spiritual gifts build up the body in maturity (1 Corinthians 12:7; Romans 12:9-21; Ephesians 4:12-15).
- Love: Love is the top priority; gifts must be used in love (1 Corinthians 13; Romans 12:9-10; Ephesians 4:4, 15-16).

Right at the beginning of his letter to the Corinthians, Paul tackles the problem of divisions in the church. This letter was written to answer questions in dispute among the Corinthian Christians, e.g. lawsuits (6:1), marriage (7:1), food offered to idols (8:1), worship and communion (11:17), and gifts of the Spirit (12:1).

Division, even over spiritual gifts, was a problem in the early church, as it is now. Why does this happen? In 1 Corinthians Paul addresses the problems causing division:

taking sides (1:12);
worldly or unspiritual attitudes (2:12; 3:1);
childish or immature actions (3:1);
jealousy and quarrels (3:3-4);
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boasting(3:21).


What are the answers to divisions over spiritual gifts? The passages on spiritual gifts specifically address division. Note some of Paul's Spirit-filled teaching:

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Jesus is Lord (I Corinthians 12:3);
we need each other (1 Corinthians 12:21);
be concerned for one another (1 Corinthians 12:25-26);
we all belong together (1 Corinthians 12:27);
be a living sacrifice (Romans 12:1);
don't conform to the world's standards (Romans 12:2);
let God transform you (Romans 12:2);
be modest (Romans 12:3)
value our differences (Romans 12:4);
use our different gifts with grace (Romans 12:6);
become mature (Ephesians 4:13);
stop being childish (Ephesians 4:14);
speak the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15);
grow up (Ephesians 4:15);
be controlled by Christ (Ephesians 4:16);
fulfil your part (Ephesians 4:16).
```

The answer to abuse and misuse is not disuse but wise use of the Spirit's gifts and power in our personal lives and our life together.

Gifts of the Spirit are given for mission, ministry or service. They are tools for the job of serving God in the church and in the world, to meet the needs of people in compassion, grace, and with authority.

Body Ministry explores this topic in greater detail including current examples of the Body of Christ alive in His Spirit, as in revival.



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2 The Manifold Grace of God

The following list of spiritual gifts is divided into two sections, **speaking** and **serving**, based on 1 Peter 4:10-12, which describes speaking and serving gifts that show the manifold grace of God: "Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. Whoever speaks must do so as one speaking the very words of God; whoever serves must do so with the strength that God supplies, so that God may be glorified in all things through Jesus Christ. To him belong the glory and the power forever and ever. Amen."

The Bible references used here are adapted from the Fuller Evangelistic Association.

Speaking Gifts

1. **Apostle**: spiritual authority; leadership over churches (1 Corinthians 12:28; Ephesians 4:11; 3:1-9; 2 Corinthians 12:12).

- 2. **Prophet** (prophecy): speaking from God; inspired utterance (1 Corinthians 12:10, 28; Romans 12:6; Ephesians 4:11; Luke 7:26; Acts 15:32; 21:9-11).
- 3. **Evangelist**: sharing the gospel; leading others to Christ (Ephesians 4:11; Acts 8:5-6, 26-40; 14:21; 21:8; 2 Timothy 4:5).
- 4. **Pastor**: caring for people; shepherd (Ephesians 4:11; 1 Timothy 3:1-7; John 10:1-18; 1 Peter 5:1-3).
- 5. **Teacher** (teaching): impart truth; communicate knowledge (1 Corinthians 12:28; Romans 12:7; Ephesians 4:11; Acts 18:24-28; 20:20-21).
- 6. **Exhortation**: enabling; encouragement; challenge; comfort (Romans 12:8; 1 Timothy 4:13; Hebrews 10:25; Acts 14:22).
- 7. **Words of wisdom**: revealed awareness; understanding (1 Corinthians 12:8; 2:1-13; Acts 6:3, 10; 2 Peter 3:15; James 1:5-6).
- 8. **Words of knowledge**: revealed insight about someone or something (1 Corinthians 12:8; 2:14; Acts 5:1-11; Colossians 2:2-3).
- 9. **Discernment of spirits**: awareness of spirits and spiritual forces (1 Corinthians 12:10; Acts 16:16-18; 1 John 4:1-6).
- 10. **Missionary**: cross-cultural use of gifts and ministry (1 Corinthians 9:19-23; Acts 8:4; 13:2-3; 22:21; Romans 10:15).
- 11. **Courage** (martyrdom): endurance amid suffering (1 Corinthians 13:3; Acts 7:54-60; 8:1-4; 12:1-5).
- 12. **Tongues**: using an unknown language; prayer language (1 Corinthians 12:10, 28; 14:13-19; Acts 2:1-13; 10:44-46; 19:1-7).

13. **Interpretation of tongues**: awareness of the meaning of it (1 Corinthians 12:10, 30; 14:13, 26-28).

Serving Gifts

- 14. **Service**: identify and meet needs in tasks to be done (Romans 12:7; Acts 6:1-7; 2 Timothy 1:16-18).
- 15. **Mercy**: compassionate action; alleviate suffering (Romans 12:8; Acts 16:33-34; Luke 10:33-35; Mark 9:41).
- 16. **Helping** (assistance): supporting others; releasing their gifts (1 Corinthians 12:28; Romans 16:1-2; Acts 9:36).
- 17. **Voluntary poverty**: identifying with poor and needy; living simply (1 Corinthians 13:3; 2 Corinthians 8:9; Mark 1:18-20; 10:21; Acts 2:45; 4:34-35).
- 18. **Giving**: liberality; releasing finances and resources (Romans 12:8; 2 Corinthians 8:1-7; 9:2, 6-8).
- 19. **Leadership**: see goals and inspire and enable others (Romans 12:8; Acts 7:10; 15:7-11; 1 Timothy 5:17; Hebrews 13:17).
- 20. **Faith**: strong assurance and confidence in God's purposes (1 Corinthians 12:9; Acts 11:22-24; 27:21-25; Romans 4:18-21; Hebrews 11).
- 21. **Administration**: devise and execute effective plans for mission (1 Corinthians 12:28; Acts 6:1-7; 27:11).
- 22. **Celibacy**: called to be single and fulfilled in it (1 Corinthians 7:7-8; Matthew 19:10-12).

- 23. **Hospitality**: open home and warmly welcoming; available (Romans 12:9-13; Hebrews 13:1-2; Acts 1(1:15; Romans 16:23).
- 24. **Intercession**: praying effectively for others (James 5:14-16; 1 Timothy 2:1-2; Colossians 1:9-12).
- 25. **Healings**: agent and means of God's gift of wholeness (1 Corinthians 12:9, 28; Acts 3:1-10; 5:12-16; 9:32-35).
- 26. **Miracles**: human channels of God's supernatural intervention (1 Corinthians 12:10, 28; Acts 9:36-42; 19:11-20; Romans 15:18-19).
- 27. **Exorcism**: authority over evil spirits; expelling evil powers (1 Corinthians 2:6-8; 10:20-21; Colossians 1:13-16; 2:20; Acts 5:16).

You may like to look over these lists and tick or note the ones most obvious in your life, or the ones you see developing.

Likewise, in a group you could let each other know which of these gifts you see most clearly in each person.

<u>Church on Fire</u> gives examples of Australian leaders and churches using spiritual gifts in renewal and revival, including in Aboriginal revivals.



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3 Motivational Gifts from God Our Father

Romans 12:6-8 lists gifts in a passage about discovering and doing the will of God in the body of Christ, using our God-given gifts. This list corresponds closely to our natural God-made abilities, filled with God's Spirit. Some writers suggest that knowing these God-given gifts in our lives motivates us to serve him as we use them for his glory. They are:

- 1. prophecy: so prophesy in proportion to our faith;
- 2. serving: so use it in ministering or helping;
- 3. teaching: so use it in teaching;
- 4. encouraging: so use it in exhortation;
- 5. giving: so give liberally;
- 6. leading: so lead with diligence;
- 7. showing mercy: so do it with cheerfulness.

Most of us do all of these things in various ways, but each of us will be gifted more strongly in some of these areas. Knowing our gifting can help us serve the Lord with gladness, fulfilled in our gifting and calling.

Paul emphasizes diversity in Romans 12. Our gifts vary. We all can use our gifts for the benefit of everyone. As we recognise our gifts we will be more fully motivated to use them to help others. These gifts include prophecy, serving, teaching, encouraging, giving, helping and showing mercy (Romans 12:4-8).

1. **Prophecy** heads the list. God speaks to us through others as well as to us individually and in his Word. He directs his body through those gifted in hearing and speaking what the Spirit says.

The risen Christ is present among his people even when only two or three gather together in his name. He often speaks to us through people in his body who have special ability in hearing his voice and speaking his word.

That word from the Lord will always agree with scripture and often explain truth in scripture. We all need to hear and share what our Lord says to us; but some are gifted in doing this. As we respond together to the Lord he speaks by the inspiration and power of his Spirit through his body.

None of us are infallible, so sometimes our impressions may be vague or very general, but we can learn to hear more clearly. Many people receive impressions or 'pictures' inspired by God's Spirit and this can help people. Sometimes we have a particular Scripture verse or passage that comes to mind and is helpful, encouraging or inspiring.

2. **Serving** with a smile, brings blessing.

Humble service for Jesus' sake finds expression in countless ways. Some are as simple as giving a cup of cold water, or providing refreshments or meals. It may be doing work like cleaning or repairing, or helping others with Good Samaritan acts of endless variety. Joy fills these gifted in service. Their service becomes a ministry. It blesses everyone being served.

Caring groups provide many opportunities and natural settings for service. This may be in preparation (planning or bringing supplies), thoughtful expressions while together, and considerate acts between gatherings especially in caring for others.

We all serve one another but some people serve with special gifts, filled with the Spirit as they serve their Lord and others. They bless everyone

around them. We can show them our appreciation and share with them in their service.

3. **Teaching** can be fun as well as work.

Those gifted spiritually in teaching help us to enjoy learning, to explore deeper insights or understandings and to apply truth to life.

Parents teach children; older children teach younger children; friends teach each other; we all learn from one another. Although we all teach, some are spiritually gifted at it. They share the life of Jesus and communicate truth with depth and dynamic.

Their illustrations, explanations, guidance and example live. The word they speak is a living word, not dry as dust.

Group life is strong when this gift is used well in discussion and action. Small groups provide a wonderful setting to develop teaching gifts by sharing and discussing together and perhaps taking turns to lead and speak.

4. Encouraging motivates us in body ministry.

To encourage puts courage into people (en-courage). Some people receive so little, unfortunately, that they become discouraged or give up. Body life suffers and ministry is weakened when people become discouraged.

Thank God for those who encourage others. They minister life and renewed strength to people. Encouraging, exhorting, supporting, enabling and loving one another builds people up and builds body ministry. God blesses that and fills it with His Spirit.

Flattery is insincere but encouragement is a beautiful and powerful ministry. We all can encourage others. We should. Some among us are gifted at this; they do it spontaneously and constantly.

Those spiritually gifted in encouragement fill others with fresh spirit and life. They help enormously in body ministry by activating others to use their gifts and by supporting them.

Whether gifted at this or not, we can all grow in our ability to exercise this vital ministry. Our times together in a caring, supportive group offer many opportunities to encourage others.

5. Giving liberates life.

It is an attitude as well as an ability; an attitude of liberality, generosity and unselfishness. Remember the widow who gave more than all the rich people. She gave all she had – two coins. That's giving!

Some give money. Others share their resources. Many give of themselves in practical and self-sacrificing ways. This spiritual gift imparts life and releases further self-giving in others. This attitude of unselfish liberality stimulates people to give and encourages concern for others.

All of us give, and must. Life grows rich as we give. Some, however, give with special spiritual insight from an overflowing heart. Their giving generates cheerful ministry in the body of Christ and enables greater outreach and care for others.

6. **Leading** helps to facilitate body ministry.

They help it to happen. We serve God more effectively when those gifted at helping do so.

Enablers do this. They help to motivate, release, coordinate and guide body ministry. Often they work quietly and humbly behind the scenes, not by up-front directing or organising.

Those gifted in helping may organize at lot, or very little. They help people. Their support encourages us. A lot of ministry happens through their influence without them actually organising or arranging it. Like oil in moving parts of machinery they help things happen smoothly, without friction or undue heat.

Everyone can help; but some are especially gifted at this. Their spiritual gift helps the body function in harmony, unity, love and power.

Groups run more smoothly as this gift is used in group life. Helpers facilitate people and activities in a group and in its outreach to others.

7. **Showing Mercy** or kindness ministers love and care.

It is gracious and tender, full of the fruit of the Spirit. Those gifted in mercy and kindness constantly bless others.

Most people are bruised and hurting in some way. Life is rarely easy. Christians, furthermore, face spiritual warfare amid the normal ups and downs of living. Thank Cod for those wonderful people who bring balm and heal hurts by their tender loving care.

All of us need to show mercy and kindness. It is part of the harvest or fruit of the Spirit's work in our lives. Some among us are especially gifted in doing this. We need to encourage them in this beautiful ministry.

Body ministry grows healthy and strong as we use all these gifts in building fruitful life together, bringing more people into a loving, caring unity where Jesus Christ is Lord.

These gifts and abilities from God blend naturally with the fruit of the Spirit in our lives. Sometimes that fruit, or product of the Spirit within us, is grouped this way:


Love, joy, peace – our relationship with God;

Longsuffering, gentleness, goodness – our relationship with others;

Meekness, faithfulness, self-control – our relationship with ourselves.

As we grow in Christ-like character, that fruit grows in our lives, and as we grow in Christ-like ministry, the gifts of God's Spirit grow in us also.

The Body of Christ, Part 1: Body Ministry explores the use of these spiritual gifts for powerful ministry and service in the whole Body of Christ, the Church. It is now also Part 1 of the book **Body Ministry**.



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4 Ministry Gifts from Christ Jesus

Ephesians 4:11 summarises the leadership or ministry gifts given by the risen Lord, Head of his church. These gifts differ from all the other lists of gifts because it is the person who is the gift from Christ to his church.

Increasingly, these gifts are being recognised and developed in local churches. Usually, where people are gifted by the Lord in these ways, they become leaders in the church, often unpaid (as in home groups or specialised ministries such as with youth or children), and sometimes paid (as on staff, part time or full time). This list in Ephesians is not a list of local church staff, although church leaders usually have many of these gifts. The more that the leaders in the church, voluntary and paid, can exercise and be supported in these ministries, the more the church will demonstrate the anointing and power of the Spirit in its life.

The ascended Christ has given gifts to his body, for "grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift" (v. 7). Verse 11 lists five gifts:

- 1. apostles
- 2. prophets
- 3. evangelists
- 4. pastors
- 5. teachers

These gifts to the church are the people, not just their ministries of apostleship, prophecy, evangelism, pastoral care and teaching.

Many people refer to them as ascension gifts (given by the ascended Lord to his church), or ministry gifts. They equip God's people for ministry and build up the body of Christ. They are vital for spiritual leadership.

1. Apostles include more than the original twelve.

Jesus' 12 disciples became apostles and remain unique. Matthias, Paul, Barnabas, Andronicus, Junias, Timothy and Silas are also called apostles (Acts 1:26; 14:14; Romans 16:7; 1 Thessalonians 1:1; 2:6).

Apostolic ministry has oversight of the churches with widely recognised and accepted spiritual authority. Apostles are sent out to establish and shepherd the church. Many have founded networks of churches or movements.

Today God still calls and uses spiritual leaders with apostolic ministry. Many fulfil this ministry as bishops, elders or leaders with acknowledged spiritual insights and authority. Some have a world wide ministry through travel, books, and mass media. We are wiser and stronger as we reflect and act on the insights they bring to the church.

All of us need a wide vision; but some are spiritually gifted with apostolic insight and authority. Discussion and response in our various groups helps us absorb and benefit from this ministry. We see more clearly how we can share in wider ministry as we learn how to grasp the near edge of some of the great needs and issues of our time.

2. Prophets speak God's message or word.

A prophetic word applies especially to the people addressed at the time it is given, although others may befit from it as well. It can refer to the future if God gives such foreknowledge or warning, but most prophecy is a word from God for and about the present.

Where prophecy is part of healthy body ministry there will be adequate checks and balances; other leaders and spiritually gifted members of the body will recognize authentic messages from God.

Inspired preaching is often prophetic – from God's Spirit. Conceived in prayer and waiting on God, nurtured in careful study and quiet meditation, and delivered in authority and power, that word lives.

Sharing together in the fellowship of a caring group can encourage prophecy – sharing impressions or revelations in the group. Similarly, personal counselling may involve prophetic insight and comment. Christ directs his body, especially through those gifted in speaking as the Spirit leads.

Every Christian can speak about spiritual truth. We all need to share our faith together; but some are gifted in bringing a word from the Lord.

3. Evangelists win people for Jesus Christ and his church.

The ways we use this gift vary greatly. Some people use it in large meetings, some in small group fellowships, and some in personal witnessing. Vast numbers of Christians around the world simply share their faith with others and lead them to commitment that way.

New Christians can quickly become effective in evangelism by introducing many of their friends to Christ. Some of these keen young Christians may discover they are gifted evangelists. We should encourage them.

Body ministry grows vigorous with new blood giving it fresh life. We can all witness in the Spirit's power (Acts 1. 8), and we can grow in our ability to evangelise. Some Christians though, are gifted in evangelism. It often seems natural and easy for them to share their faith with others. As we reach out to other people the church grows in numbers and in strength.

Caring groups can be a powerful means of evangelism. People often respond to Jesus as Saviour and Lord when they meet a group of Christians

who accept love them as they are. We help others respond to Christ when we talk naturally and simply about what he means to us.

4. **Pastors** care for people.

Their ministry involves nurturing, shepherding, counselling, comforting, supporting, correcting, rebuking, encouraging, and guiding.

Pastoral care and spiritual eldership are needed in any congregation. Clergy of course, often have this gift. Some clergy may not; they may be prophets or teachers rather than pastors, or gifted in administration rather than in pastoral ministry.

Everyone can care for others. We often grow in love as we help one another and support each other. Yet some among us are especially gifted at doing this.

This gift expresses the Spirit's nurturing, comforting and guiding presence in a group or in the whole life of the church. It enriches group fellowship. Many leaders of caring groups make fine pastors in their group. We grow stronger and learn to use our own gifts when those with a pastoral gift care for us or encourage us. So the gift of pastor involves teaching and the two are linked as pastor-teacher.

5. Teachers make truth live.

People understand it, digest it, and grow healthy as they apply truth in life. They learn.

This gift may be part of preaching, counselling, explaining, sharing in group discussion or demonstrating by example. Some who show gifts in one style of teaching may not be so gifted in another. Whatever its expression, this gift builds strength into the body of Christ by ministering spiritual life and truth.


We all teach; but some people are gifted by the Spirit in teaching with clarity, conviction and life. Their gift nourishes us. It is particularly valuable

in group life because we learn a great deal as we are led by the Spirit in sharing together and applying truth to our lives.

These spiritual gifts listed in Ephesians 4 are special leadership gifts to help all God's people and equip them for effective ministry. They build or strengthen the whole body of Christ and release further ministry among us.

The Body of Christ, Part 2: Ministry Education explores learning to minister in the power of the Spirit. It is now also Part 2 of the book **Body Ministry**.



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5 Manifestation Gifts from The Holy Spirit

We find two useful lists of the manifestations of the Spirit in the body of Christ in 1 Corinthians 12. Some authors use these helpful categories:

Manifestations of the Spirit are listed in 1 Corinthians 12:7-10:

The power to know:

- 1. word of wisdom: a divine understanding for a need;
- 2. word of knowledge: a divine revelation about a person or event;
- 3. discerning spirits: a divine awareness about spirit powers;

The power to act:

- 4. faith: a divine enabling
- 5. healings: a divine provision of wholeness;
- 6. miracles: a divine intervention supernaturally;

The power to speak:

- 7. prophecy: a divine word given;
- 8. tongues: a divine unknown language (occasionally known to others);
- 9. interpretation of tongues: a divine understanding of a message in tongues.

These manifestations of the Spirit often cause strife and division in churches, as they did in Corinth. Paul's letter addresses those problems,

especially in 1 Corinthians, chapters 12-14. That is how the love chapter of 1 Corinthians 13 came to be written. Paul emphasises the importance of these gifts, and strongly argues that we all need each other because we are all gifted differently. The eye cannot say it does not need the hand; the head cannot say it does not need the feet.

These gifts are gifts of grace. We all need God's grace in growing in these gifts, and appreciating them in one another.

- 1 Corinthians 12:28 then arranges various gifts in an order of ministry significance:
- 1. apostles
- 2. prophets
- 3. teachers
- 4. miracles
- 5. healings
- 6. helps service
- 7. administration
- 8. tongues

Leaders have various ideas about these gifts. Leadership can stifle or release the gifting of God's people. Leaders do not need to envy or fear God's gifting in his people. The more the body of Christ lives in its gifting and calling, the more the leaders themselves are able to live in their own gifting and calling, and not be overloaded with ministry which is neither their gifting nor their calling.

We all function in many of these ways, but some will be gifted by the Spirit more fully in various ministries. Gifts may emerge unexpectedly as we believe and obey the leading of the Spirit in our lives. We often discover God's gifting as we serve one another in various kinds of ministry, for the Spirit then anoints us for those ministries.

Apparently the Corinthian Christians were strong on gifts and weak on love. So in this passage Paul emphasises the need for love and unity amid a diversity of gifts. All members of the body of Christ have a significant place;

all depend on one another to function together in powerful body ministry. All are needed. These manifestations of the Spirit include a word of wisdom, a word of knowledge, a gift of faith, various kinds of healings and miracles, prophecy, discerning of spirits, tongues and interpretation (1 Corinthians 12:4-11).

1. A word or revelation of wisdom provides guidance.

Spiritual gifts can be used unwisely and cause division in the church. Some people, often leaders, receive special revelation from God concerning specific situations or needs. Thank God for those gifted with words or insights of wisdom. They guide the whole body of Christ into effective ministry.

Spiritual wisdom often manifests itself in a particular word of wisdom at a time it is needed. Often in a crisis or a difficult situation a word of wisdom will provide the right insight, guidance or general direction.

Each of us can claim wisdom from God (James 1:5). We need it. Some, however, are spiritually gifted with words or revelations of wisdom. Their advice strengthens body ministry.

Group fellowship grows deep in harmony and unity when it is guided wisely into mature discussion and ministry. People in the group who bring words of wisdom and guidance help the whole group to grow strong and stable. At times you may receive a revelation of wisdom from God.

2. A word or revelation of knowledge gives light and understanding.

The Lord grants this knowledge to many of the least of his servants as well as to those he calls into public ministry. It is not just for bright people. Some brainy people can miss it while other simple folk can see it. On the other hand, capable people like Paul have had great spiritual knowledge and could articulate it brilliantly.

This spiritual gift often comes as a specific word of knowledge. God reveals this knowledge supernaturally. It may be about someone's need. Many times it comes to us as we pray with others so we know how to pray effectively.

This special awareness about particular needs or situations may occur as we are teaching or preaching or sharing in group fellowship. Words of knowledge come to us all as we respond to God's Spirit, for truth is spiritually discerned.

Some people, though, are especially gifted in receiving words of knowledge. They may be more aware of God's presence and his ways. As we trust God for more revelation from him, we receive more and can help others more fully.

3. Faith trusts God.

Faith sees the unseen and claims it (Hebrews 11:1). The whole Christian life is a life of faith, of trust in God. Within that general, constant trust in God we also receive gifts of faith. Some people call this mountain moving faith. We just know by faith that God will act in a particular situation or way.

Many spiritual victories and powerful breakthroughs in the affairs of individuals, churches, societies, nations and world events are won by faith. God honours faith.

Every Christian lives by faith in God. All of us can grow in faith. Some Christians, however, have a special gift of faith. It's the kind of faith that moves mountains. Those people find it easy to believe God, trust Him and act on that faith in Him.

Their gift stirs faith in others. They help us all grow bold and courageous in ministry.

Those who share this gift in a group inspire others in the group to believe God more fully, claim his promises and act on them.

4. **Healings** produce wholeness in spirit, soul and body (1 Thessalonians 5:23), that is spiritually, psychologically or emotionally, and physically.

Spiritual healing may include forgiveness and freedom from the guilt or power of sin as well as deliverance from its bondage. Emotional or inner healing covers many areas like the healing of memories, release from the pain of past hurts, integration of personality and growth into maturity. Physical healing ranges from the constant recuperation and healing process happening every day (which way be accelerated by prayer and faith) to the more dramatic intervention of divine power to heal the body.

We are always being healed. Positive attitudes of faith and joy enable or facilitate the healing process. Healing comes through many means: our attitudes, prayer, tender loving care, a mother's kiss, a father's hug, a word of forgiveness or reconciliation, natural processes, medical care and the divine intervention of the Spirit's power.

Most Christians have prayed that the Lord would heal someone in need. All of us can be agents of healing, love, forgiveness, prayer and faith; but some are more gifted in this.

Many people who minister God's healing power are very compassionate and unusually loving or caring people, like Jesus. Some may be wounded healers who, having suffered themselves, identify deeply with those who suffer and so minister the Spirit's life to them.

People gifted in various aspects of a healing ministry fill group life with warmth, understanding, faith, and gracious concern for the well being of others.

5. Miracles happen.

You can't explain them naturally. They are supernatural. Some healing, for example, may be miraculous, sudden, and dramatic; whereas most healing is a process. Some resurrections have been miraculous and inexplicable except for God's intervention; whereas many clinically dead people are now revised by medical means. Some amazing coincidences can only be described as the miraculous intervention of God; but some events called coincidences just happen in normal life.

We all can be open, by faith, to the miraculous. The God of the Bible is also a God of miracles. Jesus taught that miracles from the Spirit of God were signs of the kingdom of God among us.

Some people are unusual agents of God's miracle power from tine to time. It may be rare in a group's experience but it does happen. We don't blow trumpets about that, but just thank God for His grace and goodness. Our faith grows stronger – not in superstition, but in a mighty God who acts.

6. **Prophecy** rates special mention again.

It is important for body ministry. Christ is head of his body, the church. By his Spirit he speaks to his body and directs its life.

So we value listening to him and speaking in the power of His Spirit. That kind of speaking imparts life. It is a gift.

All Christians need to hear and respond to the Spirit of God, but some are spiritually gifted in speaking by the inspiration and power of the Spirit. We need that. Body Ministry functions best when this gift is in constant use. So we should seek and cherish it even more than the other gifts (1 Corinthians 14.1).

Preachers and teachers especially need this gift. All spiritually dynamic speaking brings a word from God empowered by His Spirit.

Likewise, group life needs this gift. Groups reach deeper levels of response to God when this gift is present in prayer, discussion and teaching.

7. **Discerning spirits** sounds strange, but it isn't.

All of us discern the atmosphere of a place filled with hate, fear, anger, violence or terror. Similarly we feel and appreciate an atmosphere of love, tenderness, compassion, joy and peace.

Spiritual forces lie behind these real phenomena. We are spiritual beings. We can open our lives to evil forces by choosing to hate, hold grudges, foster selfishness, feed lust or harbour pride and bitterness.

Likewise, we can yield our lives to God's love, forgiveness, peace and goodness. The power of the Spirit of God overcomes the power of spirits of darkness and destruction.

Further, we need to discern the spiritual forces behind our religion. We can be on guard against cults and the occult for they deny the Lordship of Jesus. However, we can also hold right doctrine in a terribly wrong spirit – divisive, critical, harsh, unloving, or destructive. History runs blood red with doctrinal division and hatred. We can perpetuate that.

Deliverance is needed at times, especially for those who dabble in the occult. Jesus cast out evil spirits. The church throughout its long history has shown how vital it is to renounce the devil and all his works. It has also ministered deliverance to the oppressed, and still does.

Some people, unfortunately, go overboard on deliverance and exorcism. That can cause problems and deep hurt. Where the light shines, the darkness flees. It is better to let the light shine than shout at the darkness.

We all need to grow in discernment of spiritual forces, but some are more gifted in this discernment. They are often very perceptive and sensitive spiritually. Their Christ-like and caring ministry helps to guard groups from error or wrong attitudes. They guide us into effective and loving ministry by the power of the Holy Spirit.

8. **Tongues** are controversial, but scriptural.

Paul discusses this in 1 Corinthians 14. Tongues include private edification as a prayer language (vs. 2, 18-19) and a gift for occasional public ministry with interpretation (vs. 5, 13, 27).

This and all spiritual gifts should build up the body in love, not divide it. Love is the key. That is the point of the love chapter, 1 Corinthians 13. If I speak in tongues, human or angelic, without love, I am a noisy gong or clanging cymbal (V.1).

The gift of tongues, whether in private or in public, is more open to abuse than most other gifts. We must humbly acknowledge that the gift of tongues does not indicate spiritual maturity. Many immature Christians as well as many others who have grown in grace simply allow God's Spirit to move in and through them this way. It's no badge of having arrived. In fact, it's just part of a further release of the Spirit irrespective of how young or old we may be in the faith.

All of us can yield more fully to the Spirit's gracious and edifying work in our lives. For many people this will find expression in tongues. It can be a private prayer language as Paul used constantly (1 Corinthians 14:18), and it can be a gift used in a meeting with interpretation.

Personal use as a prayer language edifies us or builds us up. Paul used a prayer language in tongues constantly (1 Corinthians 14:4, 18-19).

Some people may be led in appropriate situations to speak in tongues with interpretation in groups or in public. When this happens, as Paul insisted, it needs to be accompanied by an interpretation so that people can understand its significance or meaning.

9. **Interpretation of tongues** accompanies tongues in public (see 1 Corinthians 14).

It is not a direct translation but it does communicate, explain or interpret the meaning of tongues as a ministry gift. It too is a gift. No gift of God's Spirit should be despised; but all gifts are to be used in harmony, unity and love for the strengthening of the whole body of Christ.

The use of these two gifts in public ministry calls for special sensitivity. In some situations it is most inappropriate and divisive. Our shared ministry grows strong as we respond together to God and do everything decently and in order (1 Corinthians 14:40).

Leaders of meetings or even church services can facilitate the wise use of interpretation of tongues by including that opportunity as appropriate. If there is a message in tongues, expect an interpretation.

Order of Gifts

Paul repeats his listing of some of these spiritual gifts further on in this chapter in 1 Corinthians 12:28-30. Some gifts have priority. Apostles, prophets and teachers rank highest in this order of gifts, then miracles, healing, helps, administration, tongues and interpretation.

These brief notes on spiritual gifts in this book include Administration here. All the other gifts in this order of gifts have been described previously.

10. Administration facilitates ministry.


Everyone can organise a little. A few are naturally good at administration; but some are specially gifted in administering with spiritual sensitivity and insight.

This valuable gift helps the whole body of Christ to flow together in more effective spiritual ministry. It releases body ministry.

Paul emphasises that our gifts differ. He urges us to earnestly desire the higher gifts and then goes on to explain the best way of all - the way of love.

Living in the Spirit is expanded and updated to include more sections and current examples, including a chapter on the gifts of the Spirit.



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6 Make Love Your Aim

Make love your aim, and earnestly desire the spiritual gifts, especially that you my prophecy (1 Corinthians 14.1).

Each of us can open our lives more fully to God. We simply respond to him in faith and claim the fullness of His Spirit. He knows us. All our thoughts and desires are wide open to him and he loves us as we are. Indeed he loves us so much that he does not leave us as we are, but changes us to make us more like himself, filled with his Spirit.

We have his Spirit within us. It's the release of the Spirit that makes all the difference. We trust Him to fill us with himself; to give us His life, light and love; to empower us for ministry. We honestly confess our failure and sin, thank him for His forgiving grace, and allow him to direct our lives. We love him and live for Him.

Then we become new people. The church becomes a body of faith, hope and love serving God in the world. Spiritual gifts release effective body ministry when used in love, unity and harmony.

Love is the answer to division over spiritual gifts as well as the answer to discord and differences in general. Chapter 13 provides a

significant reflection on the place of love in Christian living and ministry, especially its importance for spiritual gifts:

Verses 1-3: the priority of love

tongues without love is just clanging noise; prophecy without love means I am nothing; understanding mysteries without love means I am nothing; knowledge without love means I am nothing; faith without love means I am nothing; giving without love gains nothing; martyrdom without love gains nothing

Verses 4-7: the picture of love

Love is longsuffering, kind, not envious, not boastful, not proud, not rude, not selfish, not provoked, thinks no evil, rejoices in truth, bears all, believes all, hopes all, endures all, and never fails.

Verses 8-13: the permanence of love

prophecies will fail tongues will cease knowledge will vanish knowledge is partial prophecies are partial

When perfection comes, and we are face to face with God and one another, everything partial will be finished. Until then, and also then, faith, hope and love last on, and love is the greatest.

So, make love your aim, and earnestly desire spiritual gifts, especially speaking a word from God (1 Corinthians 14:1).

Unity in Community

Spiritual gifts can emerge in our lives personally. However, in the New Testament, even in the life of Jesus, they emerged mainly in unity in community.

- 1. John the Baptist baptised **Jesus**, although John felt uncomfortable about that (Matthew 3:13-17), and then the Spirit came upon Jesus.
- 2. The **disciples at Pentecost** were together, praying, when they were filled with the Spirit.
- 3. Peter and John prayed for the new believers in **Samaria** who then received the Spirit.
- 4. Ananias went to **Saul**, who had been praying and fasting alone for three days, and then Ananias prayed for him to be filled with the Spirit and be healed.
- 5. The Spirit fell on people in the home of **Cornelius** while Peter was preaching to them.
- 6. When Paul prayed for new believers in **Ephesus**, they received the Spirit.

Every New Testament example happened in community, in relationship, in ministry to one another.

God's Spirit and power can come upon us as we pray alone, but note that the biblical examples, and most believers' testimonies about this happening to them, happened as people prayed for one another.

When we humble ourselves enough to ask for or receive prayer from others we often receive the grace and power of God, for God resists the proud but gives grace (*charisma*) to the humble (Proverbs 3:35; 1 Peter 5:5; James 4:6).

Make Love Your Aim

We can also continue to humble ourselves in God's presence and ask for his grace continually.

Paul's stirring challenge points us to the best way of all:


Love is patient and kind, not jealous, boastful, arrogant or rude; it does not insist on its own way and is not irritable or resentful; love patiently endures with faith and hope; it never ends (1 Corinthians 13:4-8).

All spiritual gifts should be used this way. It is the way of maturity and humility. We do not understand everything yet; our knowledge is partial and blurred. Even spiritual gifts are limited and temporary whereas faith, hope and love last on. Love is the greatest (1 Corinthians 13:8-13).

Above all we ought to seek the Giver more than his gifts; to love the Lord. Then the gifts of his grace will build up his body in love. We will love him and his people.

Now faith, hope and love last, these three, and the greatest of these is love. Make love your aim and earnestly desire spiritual gifts, especially that you may speak a word from God (1 Corinthians 31:13; 14:1).

Fruit and Gifts of the Spirit provides personal and group studies of the gifts of the Spirit as well as on the fruit of the Spirit.


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



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














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

















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


















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























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



















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
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ABOUT THE AUTHOR
